

Table Lodge Guest Presenter: Wor. Jon Ruark

Wor. Jon T. Ruark is a Past Master and charter member of The Patriot Lodge No. 1957. He is also Past High Priest of Loudoun Chapter #55 Royal Arch Masons, and holds membership in the Scottish Rite, SRICF, and Allied Masonic Degrees.

He is the creator and co-host of The Masonic Roundtable, a live show and podcast dedicated to Masonic education, and his personal research interests lean toward esoteric and phil-

osophical subjects. He also co-authored a book called "It's Business Time: Adapting a Corporate Path for Freemasonry," with fellow TMR host RW Robert Johnson.

Outside of Masonry, Jon has Electrical and Computer Engineering degrees from Johns Hopkins University, and a Master's degree in Information Security & Assurance from George Mason University. Vocationally, Jon is a lifelong learner who teaches agile and lean-startup methods to the government. He lives in Herndon, Virginia with his wife and 4 daughters.

Every month in 2019, we will feature discussions on excerpts from the Constitutions of Freemasonry, both in the Trestleboard and during tiled lodge.

Chapter 2, Section III: Concerning Behavior of Masons as Members of a Lodge

Of Behavior in the Lodge while open: "While the lodge is open for work, Masons must hold no private conversation or committees, without leave from the Master; nor talk of anything foreign or impertinent to the work in hand; nor interrupt the Master or Wardens; or any other Brother addressing himself to the chair; nor act ludicrously while the Lodge is engaged in what is serious and solemn; but every brother shall pay due reverence to the Master, the Wardens, and all his Fellows, and put them to worship.


No private piques, or quarrels about nations, families religions or politics, must be brought within the doors of the Lodge, as being directly contrary to the rules already laid down—Masons being bound to live upon the square, level, and plumb with each other, following the steps of their predecessors in cultivating the peace and harmony of the lodge, without distinction of sect or political party."

Of Behavior after the Lodge is closed and before the Brethren depart home: "When the lodge is closed, and the labors of the day finished, the Brethren, before they depart home to their rest, may enjoy themselves with innocent mirth, enlivened and exhalted with their own peculiar songs; and sublimes pieces of music, treating one another according to ability, but avoiding all excess and compulsion, both in eating and drinking; considering each other in the hours both of labor and festivity as always free."

No questions this time, just some thoughts to contemplate:

- 1. The first paragraph alludes to the solemnity which attends a tiled lodge, as well as the prohibition against discussing religion or politics, as they will likely disrupt the harmony which is so necessary and desirous in lodge. We have always been a very friendly lodge here in Henry Knox Field-John Blair, and I know we will continue to adher to this important Masonic principle.
- 2. The second paragraph alludes to the tradition of the festive board following lodge labor. The table lodge which we hold this month is similar, though it combines the business of a tiled lodge with the cheer and fellowship of a festive board. We also oftentimes attend our favorite "lodge of refreshment" following most lodge meetings, consistent with this well-established tradition.

LODGE HISTORY

Henry Knox Field Lodge, No. 349, A.F. & A. M., was chartered in the Town of Potomac, Virginia, on February 12, 1925. It was named in honor of Henry Knox Field, a local businessman and community leader from Alexandria, Virginia, who served as Grand Master of Masons in Virginia, in 1917. Most Worshipful Field was raised to the degree of Master Mason on February 20, 1890, at Andrew Jackson Lodge, No. 120, A.F. & A.M. On June 24, 1893, he was installed Worshipful Master of that Lodge. Most Worshipful Field was born on April 20, 1860 and passed away on August 1, 1917, while serving as Grand Master.

John Blair Lodge No. 187, A.F. & A.M., was instituted on July 31, 1970, and chartered at Henry Knox Field Lodge No. 349 on February 10, 1971. The lodge was named in honor of Virginia's first Grand Master and inaugural United States Supreme Court Justice John Blair, Jr. Jewels, aprons, the bible, and tiler's sword were given by Worshipful Raymond L. Colins. The speakers podium for the Lodge was constructed and donated by Right Worshipful Clarence A. Dains. The brazen pillars were constructed and donated by the Charter Treasurer, John Newton Crawford, and the altar cover was later donated by Most Worshipful Werner Herman Morlock, Grand Master of Masons in Virginia in 1993, who died in office on Saturday, March 5, 1994.

The lodges initiated the consolidation process in February 2017, with the Resolution on Consolidation being adopted in June of the same year. Henry Knox Field—John Blair Lodge, No. 349, A.F. & A.M., officially began work January 1, 2018.
