The Eye of Providence



The Eye of Providence is a reminder that all our actions and deeds are observed.

The Eye of Providence, also called the All-seeing Eye or the Eye of Horus, is a symbol that goes back to the ancient Egyptians. In the Egyptian culture the eye was a symbol of royal power, protection and good health. It is also referred to as the Eye of Ra, another Egyptian god.

It was not until Renaissance Europe that the Eye of Horus was

changed to be a symbol of Christianity. It was at this point that it became a symbol of divine power. It was also representative of the Holy Trinity. The Eye was often enclosed in a triangle. In the 17th century, the eye was also depicted with clouds and a sunburst around it.

It was in 1782, that the Eye Providence was adopted as part of the Great Seal of the United States. The seal was developed over the course of three committees who debated what the seal should be. The All-seeing Eye was first suggested by a consultant to the first committee, Pierre Eugene Du Simitiere. In his original suggestion he thought that the Eye should be placed over thirteen shields, representing the first thirteen colonies. It was the third committee that replaced the shields with the unfinished pyramid with thirteen steps on it. The pyramid was unfinished as a reminder of the potential growth that the country still had, and that it was an ongoing project.


Quite often, the Eye is associated with Freemasonry. The first masonic usage of the eye was in 1797. This was in Thomas Smith Webb's *Masonic Monitor*. Despite the fact that the first masonic usage of the Eye was after the creation of the Great Seal of the United States, many try to claim it is proof of the masonic connection to our government. There was only one known mason who was on any of the committees, that was Benjamin Franklin. According to records, none of Franklin's suggestions were used. Franklin was actually serving on the committee to provide assistance in regards to printing, as he had been in, or associated with, the printing business most of his life.

In Freemasonry, the Eye is meant to represent that the actions of a Freemason never go unseen. That whether in this world, or the next, our actions will be judged by He who sees all. This refers to the Grand Architect of the Universe.

LODGE HISTORY

Henry Knox Field Lodge, No. 349, A.F. & A. M., was chartered in the Town of Potomac, Virginia, on February 12, 1925. It was named in honor of Henry Knox Field, a local businessman and community leader from Alexandria, Virginia, who served as Grand Master of Masons in Virginia, in 1917. Most Worshipful Field was raised to the degree of Master Mason on February 20, 1890, at Andrew Jackson Lodge, No. 120, A.F. & A.M. On June 24, 1893, he was installed Worshipful Master of that Lodge. Most Worshipful Field was born on April 20, 1860 and passed away on August 1, 1917. while serving as Grand Master.

John Blair Lodge No. 187, A.F. & A.M., was instituted on July 31, 1970, and chartered at Henry Knox Field Lodge No. 349 on February 10, 1971. The lodge was named in honor of Virginia's first Grand Master and inaugural United States Supreme Court Justice John Blair, Jr. Jewels, aprons, the bible, and tiler's sword were given by Worshipful Raymond L. Colins. The speakers podium for the Lodge was constructed and donated by Right Worshipful Clarence A. Dains. The brazen pillars were constructed and donated by the Charter Treasurer, John Newton Crawford, and the altar cover was later donated by Most Worshipful Werner Herman Morlock, Grand Master of Masons in Virginia in 1993, who died in office on Saturday, March 5, 1994.

The lodges initiated the consolidation process in February 2017, with the Resolution on Consolidation being adopted in June of the same year. Henry Knox Field—John Blair Lodge, No. 349, A.F. & A.M., officially began work January 1, 2018.
